Summary of things to Never do:

- Never purchase through a social media ad. Only purchase directly through a merchant's trusted website.
- Never purchase using a money transfer app (Venmo, Zelle, Cash App, Paypal Pay)
- Never provide information to an unknown link or phone number.
- Never immediately believe a family member or friend needs help.
- Never give out your password.

Best practices to avoid scams:

- Take 2 min. every day to check your bank accounts online and turn on card alerts.
- Slow down, take a few minutes to think things through, offer to call the possible scammer back, call a friend for a second opinion.
- Reach out to your bank or credit union. They have resources and training to help you stop or mitigate the impact of someone trying to scam you.
